

Examples of Best Practice

What can be achieved by GP practices undertaking Going for Gold and GSF Accreditation

- The numbers of patients on Palliative Care/GSF Register using the red, amber, green, blue code was over 100%
- Trebling of non-cancer and Care Homes patients on Palliative Care Register (57% 72%, 5% 24% resp.)
- Doubling the numbers with recorded ACP, DNAR etc. (16% 37%, 16% 24%)
- Carers assessment increased (100%)
- Development of practice protocols to enable sustained long term quality improvement in all areas

What is the GSF Going for Gold Programme and Quality Hallmark Award?

GSF is about the right care, for the right person, in the right place, at the right time... every time.



The GSF Primary Care Training Programme 'Going for Gold' is a practice based quality improvement programme for primary care teams, that enables improvements in care for all people nearing the end of life. The GSF RCGP Quality Recognition and Accreditation process assesses the impact of this training on practice activity and outputs with a well-established quality assurance process.

The successful practices have:

- Undertaken the full GSFPC 'Going for Gold' Training programme as a team over 6-12 months
- Progressed to accreditation, which includes summary of key ratios, portfolio with inclusion of a practice protocol for sustainability, 10 further ADA audits and assessment by conference call
- Collated and presented results to a panel consisting of GPs and nurses
- Received a full report following Accreditation, with cumulated ratios and noting areas of excellence and areas requiring further improvement
- Been Presented with the GSF Quality Hallmark Award, endorsed by RCGP, which lasts for 3 years with annual appraisals of the key ratios
- Have demonstrated really significant changes (see overleaf) with halving hospital deaths, doubling numbers
 dying where they choose, earlier identification of patients on registers, improved collaboration with care
 homes and development of an effective practice protocol for sustained coordinated care for patients in the
